One Thing Is Needful

Over past few years I have had a growing concern about the state of our youth ministries here at St. Andrew. I have the impression that many of our parishioners feel that our church and the ministries of the church will always be available, and our children and families will always be able to access it whenever they have a need. I have to say, I'm not sure that this will always be true.



Sports, dance, cheerleading, music, and other activities are all good and wholesome activities. They build strength, both physically and mentally, they help to build character and work ethic. My own children over the years have participated in these activities and have benefited greatly from their involvement. As a parent I also have enjoyed seeing our children grow and learn through their involvement in sports and other activities. I have also enjoyed the fellowship I experienced with the other parents as we all hung out on the sidelines watching the games, viewing the game, exhibition, or performance. I want to emphasize that I believe that there is so much good that comes out of these types of extra-curricular activities.

For so many years as I conducted ministries in the church families came and supported whatever we did. They volunteered in various ways. They lead, they organized, they went to the store to buy things, they donated, and they of course participated. It seems that nowadays commitments are lacking. Parishioners are hesitant to commit and get involved. I am not sure why, but I think it is because they are committed or maybe even over committed elsewhere. Also, it seems that being the one responsible for something is a very intimidating idea for some people. When asked to take a position of responsibility, the response is oftentimes, "I can help but don't ask me to be in charge." I believe that it is not a good thing for one person to be in charge of and responsible for an entire activity or event. I really believe that everyone should work together, and all

participating families should take responsibility for a part of the activity or event. Many hands make light work. Doing things this way avoids the people feeling worn out or burned out by being overburdened. Having said that, it is imperative that each of us does our part here at Saint Andrew to continue the beautiful programs and activities that have brought families to church and children closer to God.

Some people say that the children are the future of our church. I don't believe that this is true. I believe that the children are the present and the future of the church. Truthfully, if our children aren't present here now, they will not be here in the future. Their involvement in the life and faith of the church today is essential to the existence of the church for our grandchildren in the future.

Think about your relationship with the church. Is it a place you go because your parents always made you go? Is it a place you go because your children need exposure to the Greek Faith? Maybe it is a place where you go to pray? A place to go to seek salvation? Whatever your motivation for getting involved or not involved in the life of the church it is important to examine your motivation. Examine your priorities and think about what is truly most important. One day we are going to be called to give an account of our life on earth at our Lord's Judgement seat. How will we answer? What will we hear? It is my hope and prayer that we will all hear "Well done good and faithful servant" (Luke 19:17).

I believe that nothing is more important than our relationship with God. The church is an essential part of the process to having relationship with Him. It is teachings, cannons, sacraments, community, services, guidance, prayers, and more, all provide us with what we need to grow in our spiritual life and our relationship with God.

So, the church is not just another activity that we sign up for if it fits our schedule. Our Christian Faith is not something that we do only when its convenient. Our Faith is something that should be a way of life for us. In fact, Christ said, *"Seek first the Kingdom of God and all its righteousness and* all these things shall be added unto you (Matthew 6:33). Missing a game, performance or a practice is not as bad as missing out on the Kingdom of Heaven.

When Jesus was visiting Mary, Martha and Lazarus, Martha was working hard to prepare the food and take care of the guests in the house. She complained to the Lord that Mary was just sitting and listening to Him teach. Jesus said to her, "Martha, Martha, you are worried and troubled about many things. But one thing is needed, and Mary has chosen the good part, which will not be taken away from her" (Luke 10:41).

Let us not choose to be worried and troubled about the things of this world which are all only temporary, but rather let us choose the good part which cannot be taken away. Let us choose the Kingdom of God and then all the necessary important things will be added in their proper place.

Dear Fellow Parishioners,

Attached is the financial summary for the four months ending April 30, 2023. So far this year our expenses have exceeded our income by \$37,686. Even though our income has come in above budget and our expenses have been a bit below budget we are still in a tough position financially. In the prior few years we had PPP funds to make up shortfall and those items are not available going forward.

Our unrestricted cash, which is available for expenses is very low at \$52,199 and has deteriorated from the year end 2022 balance of \$89,885 which was also uncomfortably low. We normally like to have two months' expenses in unrestricted cash and are now short of that amount by just over \$90,000 and we may not have sufficient funds to meet unexpected repairs and expenses.

There are several other repair projects that we will need to tackle in the future such as paving our parking lot and repairing our outside lighting.

Although the festival is drawing near there is no guarantee as to what the income will be and we should be cautious to rely on events like this for making up shortfalls as there are many factors that could impact our bottom line.

Please keep these items in mind when you are considering your support for the community.



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

The Metropolis of New Jersey Holds Annual CLERGY LAITY ASSEMBLY AND PHILOPTOCHOS CONVENTION

Westfield, NJ – On Monday, May 15, 2023, the Greek Orthodox Metropolis of New Jersey held its annual Clergy Laity Assembly and Philoptochos Convention at "The Venetian" in Garfield, New Jersey. Over 180 Clergy and Lay delegates representing 52 Parishes from across the Holy Metropolis of New Jersey participated in this year's Assembly.

The Clergy Laity Assembly began with the Opening Prayer Service offered by His Eminence Archbishop Elpidophoros of America, together with His Grace Bishop Apostolos of Medeia and the V. Rev. Christoforos Oikonomidis, Chancellor of the Metropolis of New Jersey. Following the prayer, His Eminence recognized two of the senior Clergy of the Metropolis, the Rev. Protopresbyters Nicholas Bacalis and John Alexandrou, and on behalf of His All Holiness the Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew bestowed on them the Office of the Protopresbyter of the Ecumenical Throne.

Throughout the day, the delegates heard various reports and updates regarding the works and ministries of the Metropolis, an update on the new Archdiocesan Charter, as well as the financial reports for the Archdiocese and the Metropolis. At the same time close to 100 dedicated Philoptochos representatives gathered for their Annual Assembly where they discussed their most important philanthropic ministries and held elections for the new Metropolis of New Jersey Philoptochos board.

Later that evening, the annual Clergy Laity and Philoptochos Grand Banquet was held with over 850 faithful from throughout the sacred Metropolis of New Jersey in attendance. During the course of the banquet, His Eminence Archbishop Elpidophoros of America recognized numerous dedicated Orthodox Christians from the parishes of the Northern New Jersey Region for their selfless contributions and service to their respective communities. This year the parish honorees were selected from the following eight categories: Community Honoree, Philoptochos Honoree, Most Senior Steward, Greek Education Honoree, Parish Council Honoree, Psalti/Choir Honoree, Youth Worker Honoree and Youth Honoree.

JOHN IOANNIS ZOIS PARISH HONOREE 2023






DESPINA SEDEREAS GOYA HONOREE 2023



Homily on the Great Feast of the Dormition of the Theotokos

We are gathered here today in the presence of the Lord and His Saints to "keep the Feast" of the "falling asleep," or, Dormition, of Mary the Theotokos, or, "Birth-Giver" of God. Mary is acclaimed in the Church as "more honorable than the cherubim and more glorious beyond compare than the seraphim." And yet, this vessel of God, chosen to carry in her womb the uncontainable God, in the holy mystery of the Incarnation, who is also accorded "hyperdulia," (that is, the greatest honor and veneration) by the Church, also needed her Son and God as her Savior. He saves her in this extraordinary way and in a manner fitting for the one who is, in the hymnody of the Church also acclaimed as, "higher than the heavens" for she bore our Creator.

In Psalm 115 (LXX), King and Prophet David reminds us that "precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His Saints." Likewise, Solomon writes in Proverbs that "the memory of the just is praised" (Prov. 10:7). God has created us "a little lower than the angels," writes St. David in Psalm 8:5, but calls him to glory and the adoption of sonship through the regeneration of new birth by "water and the spirit". If this is the value that God has bestowed on His human creation, the same God who created man to be in loving communion with Him, who became incarnate to enter into our human nature and renew it, who wept at the tomb of His friend Lazarus, and willingly and for our salvation offered Himself up for the life of the world and our salvation by defeating sin and death on the cross by virtue of His own vivifying resurrection, then how much more precious is the death of His Mother who carried the God of the universe in her womb?

Yes, Mary, like all of the race of Adam, was created "a little lower than the angels" and yet, through her miraculous virginal birth-giving and holy Dormition and subsequent ascension, is raised to a place higher and more honorable than the cherubim and so much more glorious than the cherubim. These angels who specifically are charged to worship at the throne of God, now behold her as the Mother and Queen of Heaven.



As the Mother of the "New Adam," another name for Christ—the one who renewed and restored the fallen race of Adam with His new and perfect life, which He freely gives to all who put Him on in holy baptism, we are assured in the hymnody of the Feast of her falling asleep that Adam and Eve rejoiced to see this day when a new Eve of their own lineage would be raised to heaven where together they glorify the One who undid the ancient curse caused by their first sin.

Through her yes to God in being willing to carry and then bear her Creator and Savior, the Theotokos has become of the first fruit of the resurrection of her Son and our God, who now, by virtue of His own resurrection and His power over sin and death, raises His own dear Mother from the grave that was the rotten fruit of Adam and Eve's first disobedience. This is the joy God gives us in this Feast: the spiritual exclamation mark on His already life-changing resurrection is once more brought to the fore as His own dear Mother is redeemed: her body along with her soul are set in heaven beside His holy throne.

For this reason, the Dormition is sometimes referred to in Church Tradition as "the summer Pascha."

Certainly, the fruit of Christ's salvific death and resurrection and a foretaste of the final eschaton (end and new beginning) are seen here in that His blessed Mother, the Church's Mother, is able even now to experience the promise of the Second Coming of Christ, when our own bodies will be raised to stand before His dread Judgment Seat.

The falling asleep of the Mother of God is recorded in Apostolic times from the beginning. "Already in the first century, the Hieromartyr Dionysius the Areopagite wrote about Her "Falling-Asleep." In the second century, the account of the bodily ascent of the Most Holy Virgin Mary to Heaven is found in the works of Meliton, Bishop of Sardis. In the fourth century, Saint Epiphanius of Cyprus refers to the tradition about the "Falling Asleep" of the Mother of God" (OCA.org) You will recall that at the time of her falling asleep in the Lord, Mary was again in Jerusalem, praying before the holy sepulchur and place of Christ's holy resurrection. The Archangel Gabriel came to her to tell her that the time of her departure to heaven was fast approaching and gave her a palm branch as a pledge. Mary prayed that the Apostle John, to whom Christ had entrusted His dear Mother as He was dying on the cross, would be brought to her. The Holy Spirit not only miraculously transported John, but all the Apostles, St. Paul and his disciple, Dionysios the Aropogite, Timothy, and others of the Seventy. Too many to count, St. John of Damascus likenes them to clouds and eagles. Holy Tradition relates that she called each by name and wished them eternal bliss.

At the Ninth Hour, as those gathered by the Holy Spirit sang songs of praise, glorifying God, a bright lights came into the midst of them. "Descending from Heaven was Christ, the King of Glory, surrounded by hosts of Angels and Archangels and other Heavenly Powers, together with the souls of the Forefathers and the Prophets, who had prophesied in ages past concerning the Most Holy Virgin Mary."

Seeing Her Son, the Mother of God exclaimed: "My soul doth magnify the Lord, and my spirit hath rejoiced in God My Savior, for He hath regarded the low estate of His Handmaiden" (Luke 1:46-48) and,

rising from Her bed to meet the Lord, She bowed down to Him, and the Lord bid Her enter into Life Eternal. Without any bodily suffering, as though in a happy sleep, the Most Holy Virgin Mary gave Her soul into the hands of Her Son and God." (OCA.org) Then began a joyous angelic song. Accompanying the pure soul of the God-betrothed and with reverent awe for the Queen of Heaven, the angels exclaimed: "Hail, Full of Grace, the Lord is with Thee, blessed art Thou among women! For Io, the Queen, God's Maiden comes, lift up the gates, and with the Ever-Existing One, take up the Mother of Light; for through Her salvation has come to all the human race. It is impossible to gaze upon Her, and it is impossible to render Her due honor" (Stikherion on "Lord, I Have Cried").

The heavenly voices joined the earthly voices as all gave praise to God for the life of Mary the Theotokos. All the faithful kept vigil for three days after she was buried, singing, praying, and glorifying God. St. Thomas arrived only then. In tears he beseeched the other Apostles to allow him to gaze once more on the Most Holy Theotokos. It was then, in compassion for St. Thomas, that they brought her body back out from the grave that the miracle was made known: Christ God has taken His Mother bodily to heaven. Her belt and robe were left behind as relics of veneration which are still with us to this day.

St. Gregory Palamas says of this holy mystery revealed, "Earth, the grave and death could not ultimately detain her life-giving body, which has held God and been a more beloved habitation for Him than heaven..." King and Prophet David, her forebear, prophesied concerning her, "Upon the right hand did stand the Queen (Ps. 44:9). She is one closest to God. Her Son is always ready to hear her entreaties as He was when we walked the earth. For her part, the Theotokos is always eager to enjoin our prayers for growth in faith and union with Christ. She is the exception where we can honestly say that she is like her Son and not the other way around. And, like her Son, in whose image she was also made and whose likeness she attained, she, like her Son, cares for the healing of our souls and our salvation.

This day, of all days, I challenge you to think of one thing you need to receive from Christ God to advance in faith and love—the gift of one virtue, one discipline, the healing of one vice or unhealthy way of being, Know this: Our Mother, Mary, the Theotokos, stands ready to intercede for us this day when Christ, her Son and our God, is so quick to hear His holy Mother. Glory to Jesus Christ! Glory to Him forever!

Η Κοίμηση της Υπεραγίας Θεοτόκου | 15 Αυγούστου

Αρχιμ. Γεώργιος Καψάνης | <u>Μεγάλες γιορτές</u>, <u>Παναγία</u>

Έχουμε όλοι χαρά, διότι σήμερα είναι η πραγματική εορτή της μητέρας. Διότι μόνον η Κυρία Θεοτόκος είναι η όντως μητέρα μας, επειδή μας μεταδίδει την όντως Ζωή μας, που είναι ο Χριστός μας. Και σήμερα θα έπρεπε όλες οι μητέρες να εορτάζουν την εορτή της μητέρας Ορθοδόξως, διότι κάθε μητέρα καταξιώνεται ως μητέρα μόνον εάν αποβλέπει και εάν παίρνει την ευλογία και την χάρη της Μητέρας του Θεού, της Υπεραγίας Θεοτόκου.

Αλλά ο κόσμος με το κοσμικό πνεύμα, με την εκκοσμίκευση, η οποία προχωρεί και διαβρώνει την ψυχή και την καρδιά και το φρόνημα του λαού μας, έχει αρχίσει να αντικαθιστά και να υποκαθιστά μάλλον τεχνηέντως τις εορτές της Ορθοδοξίας με εορτές κοσμικές, όπως είναι η εορτή της μητέρας, η εορτή του παιδιού και άλλες παρόμοιες, όπως τα γενέθλια, που εορτάζουν οι άνθρωποι, ενώ πρέπει να εορτάζουμε τις μνήμες των Αγίων, των οποίων φέρουμε τα ονόματα. Και όλα αυτά είναι μία προσπάθεια να αλλοιωθεί το Θεανθρωποκεντρικό φρόνημα του λαού μας, και ο λαός μας να γίνει ανθρωποκεντρικός και να μην έχει τον Χριστό ως κέντρο της ζωής του. Να μη ζει ζωή εκκλησιαστική, αλλά να ζει μία ζωή μακρυά από την Εκκλησία και από τον Θεάνθρωπο Χριστό μας.

Σήμερα λοιπόν είναι η εορτή της μητέρας, της μητέρας μας. Και γι' αυτό έχουμε χαρά. Ό,τι γίνεται στην Παναγία μας γίνεται για όλους μας και γι' αυτό η χαρά είναι όλων μας. Η Παναγία έκανε υπακοή στον Θεό. Τέλεια υπακοή. Η Εύα η Προμήτωρ έκανε ανυπακοή και στέρησε το ανθρώπινο γένος από την ευλογία της κοινωνίας με τον Θεό, της ενώσεως με τον Θεό, της μακαρίας ζωής του Παραδείσου. Η Παναγία μας διόρθωσε το λάθος της Εύας και έκανε τέλεια υπακοή στον Θεό. Και όταν έκανε τέλεια υπακοή στον Θεό και αγάπησε τον Θεό ολοκληρωτικά και δόθηκε στον Θεό ολοκληρωτικά, δεν μπορούσε παρά να γίνει αυτό το μέγα Μυστήριο που έγινε σ' Αυτήν. Μία απλή και ταπεινή γυναίκα τού ισραηλιτικού λαού, μία χωριατοπούλα, μία αγράμματη δηλαδή, δεν μπορούσε παρά να ελκύσει τον Θεό και ο Θεός να σκηνώσει σ' Αυτήν και να γίνει η «Χώρα του Αχωρήτου».

Έτσι μας έδειξε η Παναγία μας την οδό της υπακοής στον Θεό και για λογαριασμό όλων μας έκανε εκείνο που δεν έκανε ο Αδάμ και η Εύα·πρόσφερε στον Θεό την ελευθερία της. Γιατί ο Θεός θέλει να είναι ενωμένος με τον άνθρωπο, θέλει να κατοικεί μέσα στον άνθρωπο. Αλλά δεν μπορεί ο Θεός να κατοικεί μέσα στον άνθρωπο, εάν ο άνθρωπος δεν προσφερθεί ολοκληρωτικά στον Θεό, εάν δεν του προσφέρει την ελευθερία του, το θέλημά του, την ύπαρξή του όλη. Η Παναγία μας προσφέρθηκε. Είπε το "ναι" στον Θεό.

Ήθελε ο Θεός να έλθει στην γη, γιατί αγαπούσε τον άνθρωπο, αλλά περίμενε να βρεθεί ένα πλάσμα που θα απαντούσε στο ερώτημα που έθετε ο Ουρανός: «Θέλετε να έλθω στην γη; Θέλετε να γίνω άνθρωπος;» Περίμενε ο Θεός να βρεθεί ένας άνθρωπος που θα έλεγε το "ναι" στον Θεό με όλη του την ύπαρξη, με όλη του την καρδιά, ολοκληρωτικά. Και αυτός ο άνθρωπος που είπε το "ναι" στον Θεό ήταν η Παναγία μας. «Ιδού η δούλη Κυρίου· γένοιτό μοι κατά το ρήμα σου» (Λουκ. α' 38). Και όταν είπε αυτό το "ναι", ήλθε ο Θεός στην γη, ήλθε στην κοιλία της Υπεραγίας Θεοτόκου, σαρκώθηκε και έγινε άνθρωπος. Και εμείς σήμερα, επειδή η Παναγία μας πρόσφερε στον Θεό την ελευθερία της, είπε το "ναι", έχουμε Σωτήρα και Λυτρωτή, το δεύτερο Πρόσωπο της Αγίας Τριάδος, τον Δεσπότη Χριστό, ο οποίος μας ανέστησε από τον τάφο της αμαρτίας, από τον Άδη, από τον αιώνιο θάνατο, και μας χάρισε την αιώνια ζωή. Και σήμερα δεν είμαστε οι απελπισμένοι μελλοθάνατοι, όπως θα ήμασταν προ Χριστού, οι υπόδουλοι του διαβόλου και του θανάτου, οι χωρίς ελπίδα υπόδουλοι, αλλά είμαστε τα φωτόμορφα τέκνα της Εκκλησίας, οι υιοί της Αναστάσεως, τα τέκνα του Θεού τα αγαπημένα, οι κληρονόμοι της αιώνιας ζωής και μακαριότητας. Όλα αυτά τα αγαθά δια της Κυρίας Θεοτόκου, της μητέρας μας ήλθαν στον κόσμο.

Γι′ αυτό σήμερα την ευγνωμονούμε, την Σήμερα πάντοτε την ευχαριστούμε. και προσκυνούμε, την δοξάζουμε. «Εξαιρέτως της Παναγίας αχράντου, υπερευλογημένης, ενδόξου Δεσποίνης ημών Θεοτόκου και αειπαρθένου Μαρίας». Γι' αυτό και ο λαός μας ο Ορθόδοξος, ο πιστός, έχει τόσο μεγάλη ευλάβεια στην Υπεραγία Θεοτόκο. Διότι γνωρίζει ότι χωρίς Αυτήν δεν θα είχαμε τον Χριστό. Διότι γνωρίζει ότι Αυτή μας αντιπροσωπεύει. Αντιπροσωπεύει το ανθρώπινο γένος ενώπιον του θρόνου της θείας Μεγαλοσύνης.

Όπως όλα τα της Θεοτόκου μυστήρια ήσαν μυστήρια αγάπης τελείας, προσφοράς τελείας, υπακοής τελείας, ελευθερίας τελείας, προσφοράς της ελευθερίας της προς τον Θεό, έτσι και η μακαρία και σεπτή της Κοίμηση, «τελευταίον ούσα επ' Αυτή μυστήριον», που λέγει και το τροπάριο (α' τροπ. Λιτής). Ήταν και αυτή το τελευταίο μεν επίγειο μυστήριο της Παναγίας, όμως και αυτό μυστήριο αγάπης, ελευθερίας και υπακοής.

Όπως προσφέρθηκε ως τριετές νήπιο –οι γονείς της την πρόσφεραν στον Ναό του Σολομώντος, για να υπηρετεί στα Άγια των Αγίων– και προσφέρθηκε με όλη της την καρδιά και την θέληση, όπως όταν προσφέρθηκε κατά την ημέρα του Ευαγγελισμού στο μήνυμα το αρχαγγελικό ότι θα γίνει η Μητέρα του Δεσπότου Χριστού, έτσι και τώρα που ήλθε η ώρα και Αυτή, ως άνθρωπος θνητός που ήταν, να φύγει εκ του κόσμου τούτου, πάλι προσφέρθηκε στον Θεό με εμπιστοσύνη.

PARENTS' CORNER

THE CYCLE of FAMILY LIFE - June 2023

It is the end of the school year for parents with children in school - elementary, high school, college, etc. Let's talk about the future now for all in the family. Let's focus on FAMILY as this time of the year we make big decisions about the future. Do we know what *"Family"* entails, and did you know there is something called *Family Life Cycle*? This month we will talk about the stages of the *Family Life Cycle*. I know I've had to deal with some of the issues of the *"Family Life Cycle"*, how about you, parents, and grandparents? I believe June is a good time to talk about the *Family Life Cycle* again!

Let's talk about us as parents as we move through these stages!

What is a "Family"? A definition of "family" according to health professionals' articles which states, "family consists of two or more people living in the same household that are related by blood, marriage, or adoption." Of course, we know family also consists of "relatives" who may not live with us, and who can forget our "church family"? Graduation time is usually a time we spend with "family", and now the summer season is another time we will spend with family for graduations, weddings, vacations, and barbeques together.

Do we understand the concept of *"family"*? How do we interact with family? Are there really stages in *"family"*? Yes! Let's examine the family cycle. It has five stages that extend from marriage to the death of a spouse.

The *"newlywed stage"* takes on new roles as husband and wife. The beginning of a new family begins as one that consists of a family of two. As adjustments are made to being a *"pair"*, the *"early parenthood stage"* comes up with the birth of the first child that continues all the way through the child's toddler, preschool, and elementary years. During those times the rewards of parenting are evident, yet they are very challenging. The *newly married stage and early parenthood stage* occurs between the ages of 20 and 40 although in recent years young adults are waiting longer to get married. Are any of your children in that stage? Get ready to be a parent to those no longer in school!

Next? The "later parenthood stage" occurs between the ages of 40+ and 60 and consists of the time when the oldest child begins adolescence and he/she goes through puberty, junior high years, senior high years, and dating, The first child may move out of the house, then the second and third child follow. The first child may marry or decide to remain single for a while. Major changes take place during this stage with parent-teen adjustments. With good communication and understanding, there are many rewards of parenting during this stage. I enjoyed this stage. We launch a new generation that is independent and self-sufficient. We look forward to the achievements our teens anticipate. We begin to become adult friends with our children. Letting go at this stage may become difficult as parents want to "control" as a way of protecting. This is the time we remember to pray for strength!

The next two stages are considered in the "aging marriage" which occurs about age 60+. We have the "empty nest stage" when the last child leaves home. Children no longer depend on parents to meet their needs. It is also a time when parents need to accept a new family member that is now the child's mate. Parental involvement includes being a grandparent, but the role of a parent does not belong to the grandparent and this stage, and it may become lonely for many. During that time besides

being grandparents, we have renewal of spousal relationships and caring for elderly parents. Strengthening relationships are important at this stage as retirement approaches. It is also important to spend more time renewing relationships currently.

We also have the *"retirement stage"* when new interests and hobbies develop as well as extended family relationships. One or both spouses retire from their career. Some couples work if they are physically able. For many it is a time for volunteering, travel, part-time work maybe, and participating in leisure activities. Not all cope well with retirement. I love it! Some are unable to adjust to their new freedom. At times health and financial problems can prevent them from looking at the future with hope.

It is also a time when a death of a spouse may occur. I am experiencing this stage now and I do not wish it on anyone! In my case, my whole world will take a different path and there are many changes for me as we were married 50 years and not being with my other half is grueling. He left too soon. I am getting through with Jesus and Panayia.

This ends the family cycle.

The remaining partner returns to single living and the widow or widower faces challenges. Two challenges occur. One is dealing emotionally with the loss of a partner, and the other is adjusting to a lifestyle change. Personal freedoms may be affected. The loss of income, health, and the ability to live independently for many is difficult to accept. Self-esteem may decline and dependence on family may increase. Family members and friends become very important at this stage as it can bring joy, meaning, and hope to the person's life. Keeping the older person active in community groups, church groups, or educational settings helps the older person stay in contact with others.

Family traditions and our faith, as those practiced in our own St. Andrew's Greek Orthodox Church are the most important elements in all stages of *FAMILY*. They are passed from one generation to another, and they add meaning to family life. The love of our Greek Orthodox faith strengthens the family unit as bonds between members grow and sense of family identity increases. Yes, I am speaking from experience. It works!

Let's remember that in our *CYCLE OF FAMILY LIFE* we must remember all of our family members not only during the holidays and the seasons, through Facebook, or texts, but through the old-fashioned way of making a phone call, sending a letter or a card, or making a visit.

The Holy Spirit

Heavenly King Comforter, Spirit of Truth, who art everywhere present and fillest all things. Treasury of good things, and giver of life, come and dwell in us and cleanse us of every stain and save our souls; Oh Gracious Lord.

We encounter the Holy Spirit throughout our lives beginning with baptism. Baptism will consist of every sacrament with the exception of confession, marriage and ordination. Following the immersion in the waters the sacrament of chrismation is performed. The person will be anointed with Holy Unction (Chrism) as the priest states "The seal of the gift of the Holy Spirit". St. Paul writes that in the Holy Spirit we are all "sealed for the day of redemption" (Ephesians 4:30). Father Paul Lazor, in writing about the service, states that "Chrismation attends to the personal appropriation of the Christian life. Everyone shares the same life but each person lives differently. Chrismation, the granting of the Holy Spirit, attends to that difference". He is the 'treasury of good things and giver of life'.

This is a powerful statement which needs be read again. It summarizes how we are different as individuals, yet united to God through the Holy Spirit, who is with us until death. He is with us until death! Our lives begin in earnest because the Holy Spirit has entered our lives. If you want confirmation of how important this is to us consider that Jesus began his mission after the alighting of the Holy Spirit on Him. That He remained with Him is seen as He follows Him into the desert. The disciples only began their mission after Pentecost when the Holy Spirit alighted on them.

We often state that things are not clearly black and white. Two things need to be considered. First, and foremost, the Holy Spirit as an essence of God cannot live in filth or sin (if there's a difference). It will depart from a person who conducts himself in a sinful manner. He hovers close because it is not within Himself to abandon God's child. Any minute act of contrition, or repentance, will bring Him back into the body. We cannot perceive, or state accurately, how close or quickly this will take place. It will and must happen for Chrismation is not to be undone. The Holy Spirit has his charge.

It is this principle that makes the somewhat popular ideology, mainly amongst Protestants, "born-again Christian" meaningless. Would God abandon his work? Would the Holy Spirit exit a soul? It is us (or those" born-again"-s) who forget God in all His essences. He is there. It's like a child who becomes lost. We haven't ceased being parents. We just don't have the object of our love in sight. Lest we forget; the child is seeking to be reunited with us as well. I had one of these people come to my door once and we got into a discussion about this. He could not see that God would not abandon him in spite of his transgressions.

We reinforce the power of the Holy Spirit through the sacrament of Holy Unction. In this sacrament we call on the Holy Spirit to 'cleanse us of every stain and save our souls'. We look for this sacrament in repentance for our deeds. It is performed to help us overcome an illness through the intercession of God. If we are aware that our time to depart this life is approaching, we will ask the priest to administer Holy Unction for the saving of our soul. This must be done while the person is living. It is not a part of 'Last Rites' as practiced in the Catholic Church. Once life has left, the soul is commended to God.

My mother had me learn this prayer when I was young. "Because it was important" and should be recited whenever the priest said it or as a prayer. There wasn't a lot of detailed religious education back then. Through the years by reading and exposure to many sermons and lectures across various Orthodox, and some non-Orthodox, jurisdictions I have come to understand my faith better. To be honest I hadn't given the Holy Spirit a lot of contemplation for most of my life. When covid hit and the churches were forced to close our family still wanted to attend services. My wife Joanna, ever ready to use the internet, had done some searching and found some churches that were streaming their service. She felt comfortable with St. Mary Orthodox Church, in Cambridge Mass., under the Antiochian jurisdiction. Father Tom Hughes is the proestaminos. His sermons were ones that stayed with you. On Pentecost Sunday he spoke of having visited a Buddhist temple and admiring the structure and architectural details within it. What could this have to do with Pentecost I thought? Continuing he stated that when he relayed his feelings to his fellow Orthodox priests they were taken aback. Then he got to the meat of the sermon. "Isn't the Holy Spirit a foundation of our faith?". "Don't we say in our prayer to the Holy Spirit who is 'everywhere present and fillest all things'? Why wouldn't He be in that temple?"

I can use the quotation marks safely because it made a big impression on me. I've done a lot of travelling and visited many sites; some religious; including non-Orthodox ones. In Hawaii, a basically pagan state, I would be drawn to the baskets of fruit, offered to the god(s) whose temple lay within the national park I was visiting. I thought "It's the 21st

century and this form of worship is still ongoing?". Father Hughes' words brought me back to that image. Why wouldn't God be there? He is the Creator. The bowl, the fruit, the natives- they're all His creation.

I mentioned this sermon to Father Nick Solak who teaches at St. Vladimir's Seminary. I could picture the other Orthodox priests as his eyebrows arched in disagreement as I began. Then I got to the quote in the prayer and his looked relaxed. Slowly he started to nod in agreement. So I finish with that. The Holy Spirit is within and with us. Acknowledge and rejoice in his presence. May your works be ones that keep Him with you.

Some may note the disparity here. The Holy Spirit is with us but doesn't dwell in sin. We are chrismated and the Holy Spirit enters us but He is within pagans who have not and material things which are not. Frankly I can't answer this. These are the things that theologians and monks spend decades contemplating. Father Tsigas would periodically give a sermon where he would state that we were religious by coming to

> church regularly. But were we faithful? These are faith issues. As humans we want answers and expect two plus two to equal four. That's our world. Fthrs. John and Nick talk of not defining God and having formed a description placing God in a cubicle that meets that definition. God is God. For Him two plus two can equal three or five or whatever. Believe and be strong in your belief.

How Can We Encourage Our Children and Grandchildren To Be Successful In College?

John M. Paitakes, Ph.D., Professor Emeritus, Seton Hall University

From the time I entered school, my father had encouraged me to study hard and prepare myself to enter college. He had emigrated from Greece and came to America at age 12 and entered the educational system. Unfortunately, at age 16 he had to withdraw from school to assist his family financially as his mother was physically handicapped and his father



was having a hard time securing and maintaining a full-time job. Despite all this responsibility and hardships, he became a successful businessman owning and operating a Diner, Restaurant and Cocktail lounge employing 50 employees. In addition, he assisted his four children in securing further education which was so important to him. He, like many of the emigrants from different countries, felt that it was very important for their children to attain a college degree even though they (parents) could not, due to the circumstances they faced adjusting in America. Granted, not everyone has to go to college to be considered successful. Success is measured in several ways; financial wealth, accomplishments, satisfying family life, helping others etc. The vocational trades can be very satisfying both financially and personally. Individual choices of youth and their desires must be considered.

Attending a college or university is still a popular choice among our younger generation currently. Therefore, as an educator for more than 40 years teaching at 5 different college and universities, I felt it was important to share my findings of students who were successful. This was based on teaching over 7000 students during my tenure. The findings are strongly recommended especially during these times when most educational institutions have returned to in class meetings. Personal interaction is invaluable in learning, communicating, and networking. The following are some of the behaviors, traits and characteristics exhibited by students who were deemed to be successful:

1. **Classroom seating:** students who sit toward the front or middle of the classroom seem to do better scholastically than those who sit in the back or in the corner.

- 2. **Preparation:** students who are prepared from the initial class seem to do better. This includes having the text, review the syllabus and taking notes.
- 3. **Rested**: students who come to class rested are more alert and receptive to information.
- 4. Class participation: students who participate on a regular basis usually do well in class. This includes volunteering to respond to the professor's inquiries and posing relevant questions regarding the subject matter.
- 5. **Assignments**: Completion and remission of assignments when due according to the professor's format is critical in placing students in the upper range of the class.
- 6. Attendance: students who attend class on a regular basis usually do better than students who do not. Generally, students should try not to miss more than 3 classes during a semester. This is dependent on each professor's attendance policy.
- 7. **Professor interaction:** Students who get to know their professor by discussing relevant issues with him/her after class or during his/her office hours usually will enhance their chances of doing better during the course.
- 8. **Student networking:** students who network and get to know several other students in class through study groups or informally, usually perform at a higher level than those who do not.
- 9. Join Professional groups or Associations: this can enhance your knowledge on related issues.
- 10. **Outside Readings:** seek out related readings outside of required text for additional information on the class.


