
# New Year A New You

When we attend a baptism of a child, we are filled with joy at seeing a small cute cuddly child who is about to be baptized. They are so sweet, and everyone wants to hold them. Sometimes the children cry because they do not understand what is going on, but they are still cute and they make us smile just to see them. However, there is more to the baptism than a beautiful baby dressed in a white

outfit. The baptism of a person marks a new beginning in the life of the person who is baptized. Some churches or faiths won't baptize a child, they wait for an age of reason or a time when a person can choose to follow Christ. We Orthodox don't promote this idea. It is our belief that the good things we learn and the good habits we develop from the time we are young, are the good things we will keep with us throughout our lives. So, we baptize infants, and we raise them in the Orthodox Faith so that as they grow and mature, the Faith will be a natural part of their life. That the Faith will be an intertwined part of their life as they grow and mature. The thought and the hope is that the faith will become so deeply intertwined that it cannot be undone.

I read a book recently called Becoming Bulletproof by Evy Poumpouras, Evy is an Orthodox Christian and was a secret service agent for several U.S. presidents. On September 11, 2001, she was at the World Trade Center when one of the towers collapsed. As she realized what was happening, she took steps to protect herself although she thought that she would not survive. As the debris fell, what did she do? She began to pray. *Pater imon o en tis* 



ouranis... Our Father who art in Heaven... In that moment, the thing that was part of the core of her very being came out; it was her Faith in God. I don't personally know Evy, however the story she tells indicates that the Faith she was raised with is the Faith that gave her strength in her darkest hour. That doesn't happen by accident. It happens because her parents raised her

with the Orthodox Faith, and it became a part of her very being.

The baptism of a person happens on one day and then it is over. Living the Faith is something that begins on the day of our baptism, but something we do for our whole life. It is a process that we enter into on the day of our baptism and doesn't end until we leave this earth. What is the process? It is the process of becoming.

When God created Adam and Eve He created them to live forever both physically and spiritually and He placed them in the Garden of Paradise. Their disobedience and their lack of repentance caused them to be expelled from the Garden and have the life of struggle that we all experience to this day.

The process of becoming is the process of becoming like Adam and Eve were when they were created. They were created in the image and likeness of Christ. We also were created in His image, however, with the fall of Adam and Eve we now have a struggle. A struggle to become like Christ and a struggle to regain what was lost with the fall.

Christ is the new Adam who came into the world to teach us, to lead us, to heal us and to blaze a trail for us to follow His example in all these ways.

He did not start His ministry until He was about 30 years old and when He did start it He started it by being baptized. At His baptism the Father blessed Him by calling Him His Beloved Son and the Holy Spirit alighted upon Him like a dove. John the Baptist was humble before Him saying "I need to be baptized by you." But the Baptism of Christ needed to happen because when He was baptized, He wasn't cleansed like we are cleansed from sin at our baptism. He never had sin and had no need for cleansing. By His baptism He cleansed the waters and all of creation so that we could be saved and regain what was lost with the fall of Adam and Eve. When John immersed and baptized the Lord in the Jordan, the mission of Christ in the world and the path of our salvation were shown. That is to say, the Lord took upon Himself the sins of humanity and died under them. In other words, He took on and was immersed in the multitude of our sins and when He came out of the water. He came alive again thereby giving us life.

So, what does this mean? It means that on the day of our own baptism, something very

profound happened. With our baptism, we too are immersed and when we enter the font, we die a death to sin and when we emerge, we begin a new life in Christ. With this new life we are clothed in Christ, and we begin to live a new life. With this new life our earthly struggles are not wasted energy taking us nowhere. Our struggles become struggles which have a goal. A goal to lead us back. Back to the Garden of Paradise where we belong. To the Garden where Adam and Eve walked and talked with the Lord. Back to the relationship with God through prayer and Holy Communion.

It is no accident that Theophania or Epiphany takes place at the time we celebrate the New Year. The New Year is a time of new beginnings and a time when we recommit ourselves to starting fresh, doing the things that we know are right and turning from the things we know are wrong. The Baptism of Christ and our own baptism is about cleansing ourselves of the infirmity of sin and being strengthened, purified and healed in Christ. Let us think back on our own baptism on our own death to sin and our coming alive to Christ. Let us recommit ourselves to the Lord and His teachings, and to the new life He gives us.

# Cutting of Community's Vasilopita (rescheduled from 1-4-2025)

Our yearly tradition has it, we will cut our Community's Vasilopita. Fr. John will bless the Vasilopita with the cutting knife crosswise in the "Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."

He then will cut the center in a circle as an offering to our Lord Jesus, Who is first in our life. Then he will proceed to cut wedges starting with a piece for the *Ever-Virgin Mary*, for *Saint Basil* and for *St. Andrew*. Subsequently, a wedge will be cut and received by a representative on behalf of each one of our *St. Andrew ministries* and *organizations*.

# Νέο Έτος - Νέος Εαυτός

Όταν παρακολουθούμε μία βάπτιση, είμαστε γεμάτοι χαρά που βλέπουμε ένα μικρό χαριτωμένο αγαπησιάρικο παιδάκι που βαπτιστεί. ποόκειται να Είναι τόσο γλυκούλικα που όλοι θέλουν να τα πάρουν αγκαλιά. Μερικές φορές τα παιδάκια κλαίνε επειδή δεν καταλαβαίνουν τί συμβαίνει, αλλά και πάλι είναι χαριτωμένα και χαμογελάμε και μόνο που τα βλέπουμε. Υπάρχουν όμως περισσότερα σε μία βάπτιση από ένα όμορφο μωρό ντυμένο με άσπρα οουχαλάκια. Η βάπτιση ενός ανθοώπου σηματοδοτεί μια νέα αρχή στη ζωή του βαπτιζομένου. Μεοικές εκκλησίες θρησκείες δεν βαπτίζουν ένα παιδί τόσο μικοό, αλλά περιμένουν να φτάσει σε μία λογική ηλικία ή μια ηλικία που να μπορεί να επιλέξει να ακολουθήσει τον Χριστό. Εμείς οι Ορθόδοξοι δεν προωθούμε αυτή την ιδέα. Έχουμε την πίστη πως τα καλά πράγματα που μαθαίνουμε θα τα κρατήσουμε μέσα μας για όλη μας τη ζωή. Έτσι, βαπτίζουμε βρέφη και τα μεγαλώνουμε με την Ορθόδοξη Πίστη και καθώς μεγαλώνουν και ωριμάζουν, η Πίστη θα είναι ένα φυσιολογικό μέρος της ζωής τους. Η Πίστη θα είναι συνυφασμένη με τη ζωή τους καθώς μεγαλώνουν και ωριμάζουν. Η σκέψη και η ελπίδα είναι η πίστη να είναι τόσο γερά συνδεδεμένη με τη ζωή τους που να μην μπορεί να διαλυθεί.

Ποόσφατα διάβασα ένα βιβλίο με τίτλο Γίνε Ατρωτος της Εύης Πούμπουρα. Η Εύη είναι Χριστιανή Ορθόδοξος και ήταν πράκτορας της μυστικής υπηρεσίας για αρκετούς Αμερικανούς προέδρους. Την 11<sup>η</sup> Σεπτεμβρίου 2001 βρισκόταν στο World Trade

Center όταν ο ένας από τους πύργους κατέρρευσε. Μόλις συνειδητοποίησε συνέβαινε, έκανε κάποια βήματα για να προστατευθεί αν και πίστευε πως δεν θα επιζήσει. Την ώρα που γκρεμιζόταν τί έκανε; Άρχισε να προσεύχεται: Πάτερ ημών, ο εν τοις ουρανοίς,....Εκείνη τη στιγμή αυτό που ήταν το σημαντικό κομμάτι της ύπαρξής της ήλθε στην επιφάνεια, δηλαδή η Πίστη της στον Θεό. Δεν γνωρίζω προσωπικά την Εύη, όμως η ιστορία που διηγείται δηλώνει πως η Πίστη με την οποία μεγάλωσε είναι η Πίστη που της έδωσε δύναμη στην πιο σκοτεινή της ώρα. Αυτό δεν συνέβη τυχαία. Συνέβη επειδή οι γονείς της την ανέθρεψαν με την Ορθόδοξη Πίστη, και έγινε ένα μέρος της ύπαρξής της.

Η βάπτιση ενός ανθοώπου γίνεται σε μία ημέρα και μετά τελειώνει. Ζώντας την Πίστη είναι κάτι που ξεκινά την ημέρα της βάπτισής μας , κάτι που όμως συνεχίζεται σε όλη μας τη ζωή. Κάτι που ξεκινάμε τη μέρα της βάπτισής μας και δεν σταματά μέχρι να φύγουμε από αυτόν τον κόσμο. Τί είναι αυτή η διαδικασία; Είναι η διαδικασία του γίγνεσθαι.

Όταν ο Θεός δημιούργησε τον Αδάμ και την Εύα, τους δημιούργησε για να ζήσουν για πάντα και σωματικά και πνευματικά τοποθετώντας τους στον Κήπο του Παραδείσου. Η ανυπακοή τους και η έλλειψη μετάνοιας προκάλεσαν τον διωγμό τους από τον Κήπο και μια ζωή γεμάτη αγώνες που όλοι ζούμε ως σήμερα

Η διαδικασία του γίγνεσθαι είναι η διαδικασία να γίνουμε όπως ήταν ο Αδάμ και η Εύα αρχικά, όταν δημιουργήθηκαν. Δημιουργήθηκαν κατ' εικόνα και καθ' ομοίωση του Χριστού. Και εμείς επίσης δημιουργηθήκαμε κατ' εικόνα Του, όμως, με την πτώση του Αδάμ και της Εύας έχουμε τώρα έναν αγώνα. Έναν αγώνα να γίνουμε όπως ο Χριστός και έναν αγώνα να ανακτήσουμε όσα χάθηκαν με την πτώση.

Ο Χοιστός είναι ο νέος Αδάμ που ήλθε στον κόσμο να μας διδάξει, να μας καθοδηγήσει, να μας θεραπεύσει και να ανοίξει τον δρόμο σε εμάς να ακολουθήσουμε το παράδειγμά Του με όλους αυτούς τους τρόπους.

Δεν ξεκίνησε τη διακονία Του μέχρι περίπου το 30ό έτος της ηλικίας του και όταν ξεκίνησε, ξεκίνησε με την βάπτισή Του. Στη βάπτισή Του ο Πατέρας Τον ευλόγησε αποκαλώντας Τον, Τον Υιό Του τον Αγαπητό και το Άγιο Πνεύμα Τον φώτισε ως περιστερά. Ο Ιωάννης ο Βαπτιστής ταπεινά μπροστά Του λέγει «Εγώ πρέπει να βαπτισθώ από εσένα.» Όμως η Βάπτιση του Χριστού χρειάστηκε να γίνει γιατί όταν βαπτίστηκε δεν είχε καθαρισθεί όπως εμείς καθαριζόμαστε από την αμαρτία στη βάπτισή μας. Αυτός ποτέ δεν είχε αμαρτία και δεν είχε ποτέ ανάγκη κάθαρσης. Με τη βάπτισή Του καθάρισε τα νερά και όλα τα δημιουργήματα για να μπορέσουμε να σωθούμε και να ανακτήσουμε όσα χάθηκαν με την πτώση του Αδάμ και της Εύας. Όταν εμφανίσθηκε ο Ιωάννης και βάπτισε τον Κύριο στον Ιορδάνη, φανερώθηκαν η αποστολή του Χριστού στον κόσμο και ο δρόμος της σωτηρίας μας. Δηλαδή, ο Κύριος πάνω Του τις αμαρτίες πήρε ανθοωπότητας και πέθανε για αυτές. Με άλλα λόγια, ανέλαβε και βυθίστηκε στις πολυπληθείς αμαρτίες μας και όταν εξήλθε

από το νεφό, ζωντάνεψε πάλι και έτσι μας έδωσε ζωή.

Επομένως, τί σημαίνει αυτό; Σημαίνει πως την ημέρα της δικής μας βάπτισης, κάτι πολύ σημαντικό έγινε. Με τη βάπτισή μας, και εμείς αναδυόμαστε και όταν βυθιζόμαστε στην κολυμπήθοα, πεθαίνουμε τον θάνατο της αμαρτίας και όταν αναδυόμαστε από το νερό, ξεκινάμε μια νέα εν Χριστώ ζωή. Με αυτή τη νέα ζωή, ντυνόμαστε τον Χριστό, και ξεκινάμε να ζούμε μια νέα ζωή. Με αυτή τη νέα ζωή οι γήινοι αγώνες δεν είναι χαμένη ενέργεια που δεν μας οδηγεί πουθενά. Οι αγώνες μας γίνονται αγώνες που έχουν ένα στόχο. Το στόχο να μας οδηγήσουν πίσω. Πίσω στον Κήπο του Παραδείσου όπου ανήκουμε. Τον Κήπο όπου ο Αδάμ και η Εύα πεοπάτησαν και συνομίλησαν με τον Κύριο. Πίσω στην σχέση με τον Θεό μέσω της προσευχής και της Θείας Κοινωνίας.

Δεν είναι τυχαίο που τα Θεοφάνια ή τα Φώτα γίνονται την εποχή που εορτάζουμε το Νέο Έτος. Η Πρωτοχρονιά είναι εποχή νέων ξεκινημάτων εποχή που ξανάκαι δεσμευόμαστε για νέα αρχή, και κάνουμε πράγματα που ξέρουμε πως είναι τα σωστά και απομακουνόμαστε από πράγματα που ξέρουμε πως είναι λάθος. Η Βάπτιση του Χριστού και η δική μας βάπτιση είναι η κάθαρσή μας από την αρρώστια της αμαρτίας και η ενδυνάμωσή μας, η εξάγνιση και η θεραπεία μας εν Χριστώ. Ας θυμηθούμε τη δική μας βάπτιση με τον θάνατο της αμαρτίας και η αναγέννησή μας στον Χριστό. Ας δεσμευτούμε ξανά στον Κύριό μας και τις διδασκαλίες Του, και τη νέα ζωή που μας προσφέρει.

Αγαπητέ ενορίτη του Αγίου Ανδρέα,

Στην εκκλησία μας συχνά φανταζόμαστε μόνο τα ανθρωπίνως δυνατά, αλλά εάν κάνουμε αυτό που μας αναλογεί με πίστη, ο Θεός με αγάπη θα μας επιστρέψει πολλά περισσότερα από όσα μπορούσαμε ποτέ να φανταστούμε. Αυτό είναι το αληθινό νόημα του "τὰ Σὰ ἐκ τῶν Σῶν". Όπως ακριβώς στη Θεία Λειτουργία όταν προσφέρουμε τον άρτο και τον οίνο, και ο Θεός μας τα επιστρέφει ως το πολύτιμο σώμα και αίμα Του. Θα βλέπουμε την εκκλησία μας, όχι όπως είναι, αλλά όπως θα μπορούσε να είναι, με τα ταπεινά δώρα μας στο πολλαπλάσιο λόγω της γενναιοδωρίας και της αγάπης του Θεού.

Αυτόν τον περασμένο χρόνο ξεκινήσαμε νέα εκκλησιαστικά προγράμματα και ανανεώσαμε και κάποια από τα παλιά. # **Happy New Year from your Stewardship Committee!**

As we enter this new year, we wanted to share with you the great work being done by your Stewardship Committee.

This year we took the first steps toward becoming a percentage giving on the way to tithing community. We called this our "Round Up" program and, thanks to many of you, it is off to a great start. So far, 50 parishioners have rounded up their pledge for 2024 and many more parishioners have inquired as to how the Round Up program works. Your enthusiasm is inspiring and is demonstrative of the love we have for our Saint Andrew community.

If you're still unclear about the Round Up program, it is quite straightforward. We simply ask that you:

- stay engaged with our parish by attending liturgy weekly, either in person or online. This is the highest priority.
- stay engaged with each other to strengthen and add joy to the lives of your fellow brothers and sisters in Christ. Make a phone call, send a quick text, or mail a card to a parishioner that you have not seen in months.
- consider your gifts of time and talents and how they can be used weekly at our parish.
- prayerfully and honestly look at your finances and decide what percentage of your income you can give for your stewardship offering.
- take advantage of the convenience of automated online monthly transfers in making your financial stewardship gifts, ensuring the timely payment and fulfillment of your pledge.
- to the degree you are able, round up your financial gift to the next percentage point (or even half-percentage point) starting right now.

By doing these things, we will be ensuring that the richness of our parish exists not by simply meeting its expenses, but in the ability to serve others in His name, as we have been asked to do.

In addition to the Round Up program, your Stewardship Committee is in the process of:

- adopting methods to communicate with you more effectively, e.g., through text messaging;
- is planning to publish a Ministry Handbook (hopefully by Summer) that will give detailed information of all the ministries and help to channel your talents to the ministry of your choosing.
- has started the Faith Works Career Ministry which is focused on offering FREE services and advice in domains such as mentoring, interview preparation, resume review, presentation skills and more.
- will be reaching out to all parishioners through individual or small group meetings to find out how we can better serve you and your family;
- and, finally, is launching a Planned Giving and Endowment program so that we can diversify revenue streams and become more financially viable well into the future.





# **AGIASMOS** HOUSE BLESSINGS WITH HOLY WATER

Agiasmos (eye-yahz-MOS, literally, "Sanctification") is the name for 1) Holy Water, 2) the service by which Holy Water is consecrated, and 3) the Blessing of Homes with Holy Water. It is customary for the parish priest to come bless a home before a family is to move into it or shortly thereafter. Each year, it is also customary for the priest to bless the home with Holy Water on or after the feast of Theophany, which celebrates Christ's Baptism and is the main occasion on which we consecrate Holy Water in the Orthodox Church.

# What's NEW?

How does a New Year become "New"? Time does not come in different flavors. If the year that has just ended has not been a flavor you may have liked, how will the New Year be different? What needs to be changed in order to be capable of embracing something "New"? The way we live is driven by the person we are. Shouldn't we begin with an examination of ourselves?

**So, who am I? How do I stand before the world?** Most of us have some sense of who we are, how we feel about things, and what keeps us going in a world filled with challenges to who we are. We all have likes and dislikes. How do we re-arrange these, how do we change in order to be NEW?

Many of us enter the New Year with the same Old Year Self. How can anything be really "New" if there is no expectation for something "New"? Luke, chapter 5, tells us that Jesus came upon fishermen and entered their boat in order to speak to the multitude. He then asked them to launch into the deep and cast their nets for a catch. Peter, an experienced fisherman, told Jesus that they had fished unsuccessfully all night and were both tired and disappointed at their failure to catch anything. It's easy to get trapped into this routine of living based on outcomes. Jesus speaks in a way that overcomes Peter's objections and they do as Jesus asks of them. It might have seemed irritating to have to answer to a stranger for their failure. Then that stranger tells seasoned fishermen to cast their nets on the other side! How would you respond? I'm sure these tired and disappointed fishermen didn't welcome this advice, but the stranger sounded different, like someone you needed to listen to. Jesus spoke in a new way. They then did what Jesus asked them to do but with no expectation of catching anything when suddenly, the nets overflowed with fish and the boat almost tipped over! What just happened? Who is this stranger?

This brief encounter changed the lives of His first apostles. Jesus was a radical new presence to their



worldly routines. In Him, they perceived something about to occur, something the world was eagerly awaiting - a NEW YEAR! Years are not just defined by time but the very life of each person. What routines did you live that will have to be changed? Let's be honest change is never easy. It demands risk, letting go of something about to be replaced with something new.

How do you "attend" Church? Do you go intending to find that new for your life or do you simply sit patiently until Liturgy is finished? Has your receiving the Eucharist been long overdue? If Jesus calls you to His Body and Blood, do you dismiss Him? It's easy to just disregard the advice of a passing stranger. What does He know about fishing?

Time does not really care with what you do with it. If I gave you a large sum of money, the money does not concern itself with how it is spent, You are the one that decides how it will be used. It can do much good or it can do much not-so-good. But these actions establish the kind of world you will be living in. You can re-invest in the same old ways or listen to a new way making itself present. If it is the same old You, December 31 isn't different from January 1. But the fishermen responded to Jesus and completely followed a new life of discipleship. This made all the difference to them and to

When you "go" to Church, you might have been fishing all night and caught nothing. You sit quietly in the pew and listen to the Liturgy, but do you "Hear" the stranger passing near you asking you about how things are going? Is there a call to receive His advice? Do you suddenly awaken to something so profoundly new, that you are speechless? Imagine receiving Jesus in the Eucharist in such a way that the "New" overwhelms you. How different going to Church will be from this time forward! New Year becomes new only when each of us embraces this New and then drops everything to follow this stranger. Jesus does not offer us suggestions we might consider. When we do what Jesus asks us to do, our lives

will be given a truly new reality, a reality that we, in our old reality, can never embrace enough to follow. Jesus is no ordinary "New" but something so "New", we must enter it and be renewed. Jesus reminds each of us that we are called to "being born" anew. This New Year ought to have each one of us routinely in a boat full of disappointed fishermen about to be transformed!

Make this a truly wondrous New Year by taking the advice of this "stranger", this Jesus, to cast your empty nets with the expectation of having them filled to overflow! Come and receive the gifts of Body and Blood Jesus offers each one of us - come and receive Him!



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# **Explanation of the Lord's Prayer**



The Lord's Prayer, my brothers, according to St. Maximos, includes seven lofty subjects: theology, sonship, equality with the angels, the enjoyment of eternal life, the restoration of human nature, the destruction of the law of sin, and the abolition of the tyranny of the devil. The beginning of the "Our Father" includes the subjects of theology and sonship, for it simultaneously teaches us that God is by nature the Father of the Son and the Emitter [Proboleus] of the Holy Spirit, and that, according to creation and grace, He is our Father, and we His sons. The words, "Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven," include the subject of equality with the angels, by which words we ask to be united with the angels, and, just as the will



of God in heaven is done by the angels in heaven, so also must His will be done by us who are on the earth. The phrase, "Give us this day our [daily] bread," includes the subject of the enjoyment of eternal life. The restoration and union of human nature is attested to by the words, "And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors," for, when we forgive our enemies, we are united and no longer divided because of a difference of opinion and will. The distancing of sin far from us is disclosed by the words, "And lead us not into temptation," and by saying this we ask that we not enter into temptation proceeding from the law of sin. And the phrase, "But deliver us from the evil one," represents the destruction of the devil's tyranny.

This teaching of our Lord is called a prayer because it encompasses all that man should ask from God, and all that is fitting for God to give to man. The prayer is divided into three parts: 1) doxology and praise of God; 2) thanksgiving to God for His past, present, and future blessings; and 3) supplication for the forgiveness of our sins and for the sins of our brethren, and various other supplications. The Lord's Prayer contains seven subjects, as we previously said, and is therefore also divided into seven parts. But why seven? This is because man has permission to ask and receive from God during this present, seventh, age; while in the eighth age, that is, the future age, we will not be able to do this, for then it will no longer be time for work, but for the recompense for our actions.
